Dunwoody's Fourth of July Parade is Georgia's largest Independence Day parade. The 2022 theme, "Parade of Stars," is a tribute to veterans, teachers, Mayor and Council Members, business owners, and everyone who makes Dunwoody great.

Chaired by Penny Forman and Matt Weber, the parade is set to step off at 9 a.m. on Monday, July 4. from the corner of Mt. Vernon and Jett Ferry Roads. The 2.7-mile route travels west on Mt. Vernon Road and along Dunwoody Village Parkway. Spectators are encouraged to bring chairs, picnics and flaas.

This year's parade grand marshal will be former Dunwoody City Council member and former parade co-chair Pam Tallmadge.

Started as part of the bicentennial celebration in 1976, the first parade route began at Georgetown **Shopping Center. It was** discontinued after several years, but was resurrected in 1991 with the news of the end of the Gulf War, and has continued ever since.

unwoody's Parks and Recreation team is looking for your ideas for names for three future park properties. The parks are located on Perimeter Center East, Roberts Drive, and Vermack Road. But before you start brainstorming, you'll want to be aware of the city policy for the naming of city parks, recreational areas, streets, roads, and facilities.


The policy is designed to guide name recognition and establish a uniform application.

Under the policy, names should enhance the sense of community and ensure that parks are easily identified and located. Public participation and input are also encouraged in the naming policy.

Here are additional considerations for names:

- Geographic location
- An outstanding feature of the area
- Commonly recognized subjects of historical significance such as event, person, group, culture, or place
- A person or group that significantly contributed to the acquisition or development of the park or facility
- An individual who provided exceptional service in the interest of the city or community
- If naming after a person, that person must be deceased for a minimum of five years, but the Mayor and Council can make an exception and waive the time requirement

This is where you come in. We invite you to email your ideas to parks@dunwoodyga.gov. Parks and Rec will consider all ideas and create a list of top choices to present to the City Manager. The City Manager will then make a recommendation to the Mayor and City Council for final naming decisions. There is no specific timeline, but don't delay. We want to hear your great ideas. And be sure to specify the park for which you're proposing a name.



Throwing shade

The City of
Dunwoody is joining the
Trees Atlanta Front Yard
Tree Planting Program.
The goal is to plant up
to 40 shade trees in
front yards across
Dunwoody.

"This is a great program to further our goal of protecting and building up Dunwoody's tree canopy," said Dunwoody Community Development Director Richard McLeod. "This will also give residents a greater sense of ownership in Dunwoody's urban forest."

Trees Atlanta, a nonprofit organization committed to the care and replenishment of metro Atlanta's urban forest, will manage the processing of tree requests and coordinate with homeowners for the selection, placement, and installation of up to two front yard trees per home through this program.

"Since starting the front yard tree program in 2017, we've placed more than 2,000 trees in front yards across metro Atlanta," explained Judy Yi, director of marketing for Trees Atlanta. "We appreciate the City of Dunwoody for expanding its efforts to protect and plant trees through the Front Yard Tree program."

In April, the Dunwoody City Council voted to commit \$10,000 to the program, so there is no cost to property owners. Planting will begin in October 2022 and continue through March 2023, if necessary.

The new trees must be planted on private property within 35 feet of a right-of-way.



Front yard locations allow mature trees to provide shade onto public areas. After planting, property owners shall be responsible for watering and maintaining the new trees.

"Trees are good for the environment, help prevent erosion and beautify our community," said Dunwoody Mayor Lynn Deutsch. "I look forward to seeing the benefits of this partnership grow."

Dunwoody property owners interested in being part of the program must submit an online application, which will be available starting August 1 via **www.dunwoodyga. gov/frontyardtree**. Trees will be allotted on a first-come, first-served basis.


In Brook Run Park, the Ausomewalkies, founded by Ash Dudley, now includes almost 30 members who meet to make friends and walk along the park's meandering trail.

Run the Wood, a group of running enthusiasts, typically meets on the second and fourth Saturdays of each month for a three-mile run or run/walk through Dunwoody that begins on Nandina Lane.

"We run the trails and streets or the track at Dunwoody High School," said Lauren Sok. "And sometimes we will end our run in the park off of Roberts Drive and enjoy a relaxing yoga session together or do brunch with friends. Other times, we'll do an evening run and drop into Moondog Growlers for a quick beer." Founded by Sok and Lindsey Amerson, the group is open to all levels of runners and typically averages 8-10 members per run. Runners gather at 7:30 a.m. at Sok's Functionize Physical Therapy office at 5054 Nandina Lane to begin.

Members stay abreast of upcoming events via a members-only Facebook page. Those interested in joining are invited to request membership via the group's Facebook page called the Dunwoody Road Runners.

Bike Walk Dunwoody is an all-volunteer organization

dedicated to making it safer,

group's monthly Dunwoody
Community Bike Ride is a 4.5mile loop on the third Sunday
of each month, March through
November. Open to riders of all







Dunwoody's stormwater utility fee is going up this year in line with the Municipal Cost Index and the rising cost of construction materials.


Stormwater

The city spends more than \$1 million annually replacing or lining failing stormwater pipes connected to the public right-of-way. Nearly all the failing pipes are corrugated metal pipes that have rusted out due to their age. The pipes were designed to have a service life of 25 years, and many of the pipes in Dunwoody were installed more than 40 years ago.

The city has identified four miles of pipes within the public right-of-way that have not yet failed but will likely require rehabilitation in the next five to ten years based on age and condition rating. Since 2009, repairs have been made to 6.4 miles of pipe in Dunwoody.

In addition to addressing city infrastructure needs, Dunwoody's stormwater team is committed to improving water quality by proactively managing rain runoff that flows through drainage networks into streams, creeks, and ponds. Ball Mill Creek is a great example and a clear success story. Running through Dunwoody Park at the Dunwoody Nature Center, Ball Mill Creek was once classified by the state as "impaired" due to high levels of fecal coliform

"We identified sanitary sewer overflows as a source of trouble, and we worked with DeKalb County to stabilize nearby sewer lines," explained Stormwater Utility Manager Carl Thomas. "The EPA determined we reduced pollutant levels enough that Ball Mill Creek was removed as a source of concern."

To fund stormwater system maintenance and clean water initiatives, Dunwoody levies stormwater utility fees for residential and commercial customers. Stormwater utility fees are based on the impervious square footage of a given property. Impervious surfaces like driveways, sidewalks, roofs, streets, and parking lots prevent rainfall from naturally soaking into the ground, creating additional surface runoff. The fees are competitive and tied to the Municipal Cost Index (MCI), which is designed to show the effects of inflation on the cost of providing municipal services. In 2022, the stormwater utility fee for detached, single-family, residential property owners will be \$89.51, which is up from \$80.77 in 2021. This is a direct result of the increase in the MCI and the rising cost of construction materials.

While the City works to keep pollutants out of local waterways, businesses and residents also play an important role. Here are some ways to help:



Don't dump anything down storm drains



Clean up after vour pet



Don't pour fats, oils, or grease down the drain



Limit fertilizers and pesticides

Inspect your septic tank

Got a Yellow Dot? It could save your life

A yellow dot decal on your car or the main entrance to your home sends first responders an instant message.

In case of an emergency, police and medical responders are trained to check the glove compartment of your car, or your kitchen refrigerator, for important details about allergies, medical conditions and/or medications that would be important for your care.

Dunwoody is one of eight cities or regions in Georgia that participate in the Georgia Department of Health's Yellow Dot program. No registration is required. Residents who are 55 and over, or medically fragile, can request the free materials that include a folder for holding the completed forms and information, decals and a magnetic clip to help keep the materials in one place.

A few years ago, DPD did a welfare check on a Dunwoody resident when friends reported that she had not shown up for a holiday party. When she did not answer the door, a yellow dot decal alerted them to check the glove compartment of her car parked in the driveway. After reviewing her medical information, they made the decision to enter the apartment and found her in a diabetic coma. She was transported to the hospital where she remained in a coma for three days before making a full recovery. The Yellow Dot decal, quite likely, saved her life.

DPD tackles growing drug crisis

Since 2015,

Dunwoody Police have administered

Communities across the country are dealing with a troubling increase in drug overdoses and deaths. Recent numbers released by the National Center for Health Statistics show more than 107,000 Americans died from drug overdoses in 2021, which marks a record high. The City of Dunwoody also set a record last

year with six overdose deaths.

The Dunwoody Police Department began tackling the problem in 2015 by equipping police officers with Naloxone, a prescription medicine that's used to reverse an opioid overdose. Naloxone is a proven lifesaver. Since 2015, Dunwoody Police have administered Naloxone to 49 overdose victims. Two deaths have been

recorded after Narcan was deployed. Many victims required multiple doses to be revived.

Opioids include heroin and prescription pain medications such as morphine, hydrocodone, and oxycodone. Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid that is 80-100 times stronger than morphine. Because of its powerful opioid properties, Fentanyl is increasingly being sold in place of heroin or as an additive to increase its potency. Many users have no idea they're purchasing fentanyl, which can lead to overdoses.

"The fentanyl on the streets today is being manufactured in China and transported into the U.S. across the border with Mexico.," said Dunwoody Police Chief Billy Grogan.

In April, Chief Grogan visited the Mexican border in El Paso as part of a meeting of the executive board of the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas (HIDTA) program of the Drug Enforcement Agency. Dunwoody is part of the Atlanta-Carolinas HIDTA, which aims to significantly reduce drug availability in its three-state area.

"Agents told us they're seeing a huge uptick in the amount of fentanyl they're seizing at the border," added Grogan. "It's so powerful that one pill can kill."

Officers with the Dunwoody Police Department carry Narcan, a Naloxone product that's sprayed into the nose of an individual experiencing an overdose. Georgia law allows

> first responders to carry and administer this medication and provides immunity from civil and criminal liability when administered. The "Good Samaritan" component of the "Opioid Antidote and Overdose Prevention Act" also provides legal protections, both civil and criminal, to the overdose victim and the person who seeks medical assistance.

Narcan is available over the counter without a prescription.

You can identify an opioid overdose by a combination of three symptoms known as the Opioid Triad. The triad consists of:

- · Pinpoint pupils
- Unconsciousness
- Respiratory depression

Keeping prescription drugs out of the wrong hands is critical. The Dunwoody Police Department has a Med-Return drug collection unit available in the second floor lobby. Bring expired, unwanted and unused medication for safe disposal anytime.





High Street underway





Foundation work and parking deck construction for High Street, the \$2 billion mixed-use development at Hammond Drive and Perimeter Center Parkway, is underway. The project will be developed in phases. In addition to the project's 222,000 sq. ft. of existing office space, the first phase will include 150,00 sq. ft. of retail, a 3/4-acre park, 90,000 sq. ft. of new loft offices and 598 apartment homes. With the final phase spanning 10 blocks, High Street is set to include Puttshack, an upscale mini golf experience; a unique water feature; bicycle-friendly streets and fresh dining options in a walkable, energetic hub for restaurants and entertainment.
